1st Annual Primary Elementary SIC Provincial Conference

Our first conference will highlight the esteemed Dr. David Booth. Dr. Booth is Professor Emeritus, Scholar in Residence at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education (OISE) At the University of Toronto; Curriculum, Teaching and Learning Department. His research and writing are now driven by the differences between what and how young people read outside school contrasted with what they read inside the classroom. How can we bridge the two (or more) literacy communities, and support readers who will have the strategies to make the most meaning possible from the different texts they will want to and will need to read? What resources (both

paper and technological) will help teachers deepen and expand student experiences with texts, and how will we recognize literacy progress and competency, while continuing to support and encourage meaningful and satisfying interaction with printed and visual texts? Our theme is Differentiating Literacy Instruction—
